The Washington Legal Foundation recently published Brad Davis in its latest Legal Opinion Letter. In his article [“Federal Court Finds Arbitration Act’s Transportation-Worker Exemption Inapplicable to Local Delivery Driver,”](#) Brad discusses a recent decision from the Southern District of Florida, *Bean v. ES Partners, Inc.* There, the court addressed the following question: can a local delivery driver who never crosses state lines escape arbitration, even when the goods he delivers are manufactured out of state? *No*, the court said. *Bean* joins a growing number of courts that have weighed in on whether such workers qualify as transportation workers engaged in interstate commerce under the Section 1 exemption of the Federal Arbitration Act.
